'Faster than the Grim Reaper'

EMS, doctors clock 'incredible' time

JEFFERSON — The Jefferson Emergency Rescue District ambulance moved "faster than the Grim Reaper" through a March snowstorm. In its bay, 74-year-old Rollin Spellman's heart attack

worsened. The Andover man's emergency call put the district's new heart attack protocol to the test that day. Rather than stopping at UH Geneva for transfer to a Cleveland hospital and risk traffic delays and massive cardiac damage — they were instead headed straight to University Hospitals Geauga Medical Center, which had gained special privilege to treat heart

attack patients. The UH doctors knew Spellman was coming, but they didn't know one of his arteries was entirely blocked until he arrived at the ER about 35 minutes later. Dr. Gregory Stefano catheterized the artery, inflated it with a balloon and placed a stent to keep it open — all within 11 minutes of Spell-

man's arrival. That's remarkably fast, said Geoffrey Patty, OH Geauga's chest pain coordinator. The total time, just under 70 minutes from the onset of symptoms to the arterial stent, was "incredible," said one of the Jefferson

On a national scale, doctors expect to receive and treat a heart attack within 90 minutes, and 60 minutes is within the 50th percentile of cases,

paramedics, Jake Rice.

Metroparks celebrates county's pristine, 'scenic' rivers

HARPERSFIELD TOWNSHIP — The natural, pristine oeuvre of Harpersfield Covered Bridge Metropark was the "picturesque" backdrop for a Sunday afternoon celebration 50 years in the mak-

The Ashtabula County Metroparks on Sunday invited county and regional leaders, partners and all nature lovers to commemorate Ohio's Scenic Rivers Act, established in

1968 to help the state Department of Natural Resources protect Ohio's "high quality" stream systems. It was the first program of its kind in the country.

Since its inception, 14 Ohio rivers spanning 800 miles have been dubbed "scenic." Three of those are in Ashtabula County: the Ashtabula and Grand rivers and Conneaut Creek — the latter two of which are also designated as more natural, "wild" rivers.

Salmonella linked to pre-cut melon sickens 60 in Midwest

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) - Health officials say a salmonella outbreak linked to pre-cut melon has sickened 60 people in five Midwestern

The Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention says Caito Foods LLC on Friday recalled pre-cut watermelon, honeydew melon, cantaloupe and fruit medleys containing at least one of those melons that were produced at its

facility in Indianapolis.

It says the five states where people were sickened are Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri and Ohio.

The CDC says the fruit was also distributed to stores in Georgia,

Kentucky and North Carolina.

It was sold in clear plastic clamshell containers at Costco, Jay C, Kroger, Payless, Owen's, Sprouts, Trader Joe's, Walgreens, Walmart and Whole

Foods/Amazon. Officials say people

should throw away or return recalled prod-The CDC says 31

of the people sickened have been hospitalized, but there have been no

deaths reported.

Those sickened often develop diarrhea, fever and abdominal cramps 12 to 72 hours after eating the contaminated food.

The illness often lasts 4 to 7 days.

Patty said. He called the decision to take Spellman to Geauga "progressive thinking" on the first responders' behalf.

Rice, who advocated for the new heart attack transport route that Spellman took, said though Ashtabula County Medical Center has a catheterization lab, Geauga's is interventional.

"For us to be able to go to a hospital with (coronary intervention), which is basic, a hospital that can do interventional cardiology around the clock — (Geauga is) right in our back yard. That's why the decision was made to take him there," he said. "Time is muscle and the less time this blockage is occurring, the better outcome this patient

Earlier that day, Spellman had just wrapped a routine appointment with his physical ther-

apist Andrew Brown at Jefferson Rehabilitation and Wellness along South Chestnut Street in Jefferson when the symptoms showed. "He was pale and his

face looked pasty," Brown said. "Rollin told me he was feeling very uncomfortable."

Spellman's vitals showed a heart attack, though he wasn't feeling any chest pain, he said. It took Rice and his driver, Antonio Ferraro, mere minutes to first meet Spellman.

They gave him an IV and an electrocardiogram to confirm irregularities in Spellman's

"He was having an active heart attack and all the cards played out perfectly for him," Rice said. "(Brown) recognized that something wasn't right and gave him aspirin. ... I'm just grateful that everything worked in his favor. I'm just glad we provided the best care for

"It's just a great example of how advanced EMS has become as far as treatment in the field."

Spellman returned a month later to Stefano for three more stents, after other, lesser blockages were found, and for an angioplasty procedure.

"I heard Dr. Stefano played basketball in school," he's quoted in a release from the hospital.

"I'm glad to have him and God on my team."


